Your Excellency,

The Mission for Global Change (MGC) respectfully recalls its representation dated 10 April 2024, which was submitted to the Heads of 194 Member States of the United Nations, proposing certain structural reforms in the global political system in light of the emerging realities of globalization, geopolitical tensions, technological advancements, and growing inequalities and interdependence among nations and people of the world.

In view of the continuing expansion of armed conflicts and geopolitical tensions across different regions of the world, the issues highlighted in the earlier representation have become increasingly urgent. The present communication is therefore submitted as a respectful reminder and as an invitation to the Government of Your Excellency to kindly examine the proposals contained in that representation.

The initiative of the Mission for Global Change is based on the independent research and political thinking of the undersigned concerning the evolution of global governance institutions, including proposals relating to the structural reform of the United Nations, the gradual formation of regional and hemispheric cooperative political institutions, and the recognition of certain international and global rights of the people of the world.

It may be respectfully clarified that the proposals outlined in the accompanying documents are not limited to a general appeal for peace or institutional reform. Rather, they represent a conceptual framework developed through sustained study, including preliminary outlines concerning the possible structure of supranational institutions, the evolution of citizenship and sovereignty in an interconnected world, and the mechanisms required to protect international and global rights of people of the world.

The purpose of this communication is therefore to invite thoughtful policy consideration by the Government of Your Excellency and the concerned ministries, particularly the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, regarding the ideas and proposals presented herein.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Proposal for Upgrading Global Governance Architecture and Reforming the United Nations

Background

The Mission for Global Change (MGC) submitted a comprehensive representation dated **10 April 2024** to the Heads of 194 Member States of the United Nations. The representation highlighted the urgent need to reassess and upgrade the present global governance architecture in light of the profound transformations brought about by globalization, geopolitical tensions, technological advancements, recurring armed conflicts, growing inequalities and interdependence among nations and people of the world.

In view of the continued expansion of wars and geopolitical tensions in different parts of the world, the issues raised in that representation have become even more relevant. The present communication is therefore submitted as a reminder and an invitation for thoughtful policy consideration by the governments of Member States.

Nature of the Proposal

The initiative of the Mission for Global Change is not limited to a general appeal for peace or institutional reform. It is based on **long-term research and conceptual work concerning the structural evolution of global governance**.

The representation submitted earlier outlines a **detailed conceptual framework for upgrading the institutional structure of the international system**, including:

- a proposed architecture for reforming the United Nations;
- a framework for the formation of regional and hemispheric political unions inspired by successful experiences such as the European Union;
- the conceptual foundations for new supranational institutions capable of protecting the international and global rights of people of the world;

- and an evolved understanding of **separation of power, citizenship and sovereignty** suited to an era of deep global interdependence.

These proposals are supported by conceptual notes, draft frameworks, and institutional outlines developed through independent study and dialogue in international civil society forums.

Rationale

In many governmental and diplomatic institutions, policy thinking often remains confined within established academic frameworks and existing institutional arrangements. While such approaches provide stability, they can sometimes make it difficult to recognize or evaluate transformative institutional ideas that may initially appear unconventional.

However, the history of political development proves that major institutional advancements—such as the creation of modern constitutional states or the establishment of international organizations—have always required **innovative institutional designs based on new political visions**.

The Mission for Global Change therefore respectfully submits that the proposals contained in its representation deserve **serious policy evaluation rather than summary dismissal on grounds of perceived impracticality**.

The intention of the undersigned is not to prescribe solutions unilaterally but to invite the governments of the world to **examine and assess the conceptual framework already developed** and to determine whether elements of this work may contribute constructively to the future evolution of global governance.

Central Idea

The representation proposes that the next stage of political evolution may involve the **vertical structuring of governance**, extending from nation states to regional unions and ultimately to reformed global institutions capable of addressing challenges that transcend national borders.

Such an institutional evolution could help to:

- prevent recurring wars and geopolitical conflicts;
- safeguard global peace and collective security;
- protect the international and global rights of people of the world;
- address economic inequalities and environmental risks;
- and strengthen democratic participation in regional and global decision-making.

Invitation for Policy Consideration

The Mission for Global Change respectfully invites the governments of Member States and their foreign ministries to:

- examine the representation dated **10 April 2024** along with its conceptual annexures;
- evaluate the proposed institutional frameworks and constitutional outlines;
- provide their considered views, suggestions, or critiques; and
- engage in dialogue aimed at exploring whether these ideas may contribute to the future reform and strengthening of the United Nations and the broader international system.

Concluding Note

The purpose of this initiative is to encourage **serious intellectual and policy engagement with new ideas concerning the evolution of global political institutions.**

If the proposals outlined by the Mission for Global Change are found to have merit, the undersigned humbly requests that Member States consider facilitating wider international discussion on these ideas so that humanity may move toward a more effective, peaceful, and cooperative global political order.

1. Background

The Mission for Global Change (MGC) respectfully recalls its earlier representation (Ref: MGC/CLR/24/UN Members/126/200) dated **10 April 2024**, which was transmitted to the Heads of State and Government of **194 Member States of the United Nations** by email on **22 April 2024**.

The said representation invited the attention of governments to the urgent need for **systematic mechanisms for the prevention of wars** and for the gradual recognition of **International and Global Rights of citizens of all countries**.

The purpose of that representation was to draw the attention of the international community to the urgent necessity of **reforming the present structure of the United Nations and developing new supranational governance mechanisms** in light of the rapidly changing global realities, technological advancements, and the increasing interdependence of nations. In such circumstances, **national governments alone are increasingly unable to safeguard the long-term security, prosperity, and fundamental rights of their citizens without effective international institutional cooperation**.

Furthermore, rapid technological progress, automation, and globalized economic competition are transforming labour markets and widening economic inequalities. These developments demand **new frameworks of governance capable of**

guaranteeing international and global rights of citizens beyond the traditional boundaries and jurisdiction of nation states. In many instances, economic and political influence exercised by transnational actors exceeds the regulatory capacity of individual states.

In view of the **expanding wars, armed conflicts, and geopolitical tensions across different regions of the world**, the concerns raised in the representation of April 2024 have become even more relevant and pressing. The recurrence of large-scale armed conflicts in recent years has once again demonstrated the structural limitations of the existing global governance mechanisms in preventing wars and ensuring the safety of civilian populations.

Recent wars and humanitarian crises have revealed a painful reality: despite the collective aspirations of humanity for peace, the present structure of the United Nations has limited capacity to **prevent wars promptly or to enforce durable peace and ensure global rights**. As a consequence, civilian populations across the world continue to face devastating consequences of armed conflicts.

2. Contemporary Global Context

Humanity is currently witnessing a period of increasing geopolitical instability and armed confrontation.

Conflicts and tensions in several regions—including those involving **Ukraine–Russia, India–Pakistan, the United States–Israel–Iran, Pakistan–Afghanistan, Thailand–Cambodia, China–Taiwan, and the United States–Cuba–Venezuela**—demonstrate the persistent fragility of the global security architecture.

These conflicts, whether ongoing or latent, carry the potential to escalate into wider wars and are already causing:

- loss of human life,
- destruction of cultural heritage,
- severe economic disruption and recession,
- displacement and homelessness for millions of people, and
- significant environmental damage that undermines decades of global conservation efforts.

The consequences of war are not limited to the most vulnerable populations. Increasingly, even economically advanced societies in Europe, West Asia and other regions are experiencing the economic and social repercussions of prolonged geopolitical conflicts.

3. Rationale for the Present Initiative

The Mission for Global Change submits that the persistent recurrence of wars in different parts of the world indicates the urgent need for **systematic institutional innovations in global governance**.

The proposals contained in the earlier representation and in the accompanying documents therefore seek to contribute to the evolving global dialogue on:

- the **systematic prevention of wars**,
- the strengthening and modernization of international institutions, and
- the gradual recognition of **International and Global Rights of citizens** beyond the boundaries of national jurisdictions.

These proposals are not intended merely as academic reflections or material for periodic seminars and conferences. Rather, they arise from the recognition that armed conflicts continue to produce **widespread hunger, poverty, displacement, violence, and human suffering** affecting millions of people across Africa, Asia, Europe and South America.

4. Need for Structural Reform

The Mission for Global Change respectfully submits that **structural reform of the United Nations and the establishment of complementary supranational institutions** have become indispensable in order to:

- prevent the recurrence of devastating wars and armed conflicts;
- safeguard international peace and collective security;
- protect the economic and environmental interests of humanity;
- guarantee international and global rights for citizens of all countries;
- enable equitable participation of all sections of global society in development and prosperity.

Historically, the evolution of democratic governance required the **horizontal separation of powers** within nation states. In the present era of global interdependence, it has become necessary to consider the **vertical structuring of governance** — from national governments to regional unions and eventually to global institutions capable of addressing challenges that transcend national boundaries.

5. Proposed Direction for International Cooperation

In this regard, the Mission for Global Change respectfully reiterates its proposal that the governments of the world may consider initiating **appropriate international treaties** in three progressive stages:

1. **Formation of regional unions of neighbouring countries**, broadly inspired by the model of the European Union, in order to coordinate economic development, security, and protection of international rights.

2. **Formation of hemispheric governance frameworks** through cooperation among such regional unions, enabling broader coordination of policies on global challenges.
3. **Comprehensive reform of the United Nations**, leading to the establishment of a competent global institutional structure capable of safeguarding global rights and ensuring lasting peace.

These measures are intended not to diminish national sovereignty but to **strengthen the collective capacity of nations to address domestic challenges that no single state can resolve alone**

6. Conceptual Basis

The present initiative of the Mission for Global Change is based on independent research and policy reflections concerning the long-term evolution of global governance.

The conceptual framework presented in the accompanying documents explores:

- possible institutional reforms within the **United Nations system**,
- the development of cooperative regional and hemispheric political structures,
- the articulation of certain **International and Global Rights applicable to citizens of all countries**, and
- the evolving relationship amongst **separation of governing power, citizenship, sovereignty, and global governance** in an increasingly interconnected world.

These ideas are offered for **policy evaluation and consideration by governments and diplomatic institutions**, rather than as prescriptive or binding proposals.

7. Reference to Earlier Representation

The earlier representation submitted in April 2024 was addressed to the Head of State or Government of each Member State on behalf of **Mission for Global Change**, a forum of civil society organizations working to promote regional and global harmony and to prevent conflicts and wars.

A copy of that representation is once again attached to this communication for the ready reference of the esteemed authorities.

The Mission respectfully requests that the competent authorities of Member States may kindly examine the proposals contained therein and consider them within their respective policy and research frameworks.

3. **Facilitate a meeting or dialogue** between representatives of the Government of Your Excellency and a delegation of the Mission for Global Change to discuss these proposals in greater detail.
4. **Consider convening or supporting an international conference or dialogue platform** dedicated to exploring new institutional arrangements for global peace, cooperation, and protection of citizens' international and global rights.

Provide suggestions, intellectual collaboration, or institutional support that may assist in building global consensus on the proposed reforms.

10. Concluding Submission

Your Excellency, the people of the world today face unprecedented challenges. Hence therefore, the Mission for Global Change respectfully submits that the challenges confronting humanity today require **renewed political imagination, institutional innovation, and constructive international dialogue and bold and visionary leadership from the international community.**

The Mission for Global Change firmly believes that the present moment offers an opportunity for the visionary leadership of nations of the world to work collectively toward **a more effective, democratic, and humane global political architecture** capable of safeguarding peace and survival and prosperity for future generations.

The Mission for Global Change would be grateful if the esteemed authorities may kindly examine the materials submitted and, if considered appropriate, communicate any observations or suggestions regarding the ideas presented.

The Mission would also respectfully appreciate being informed, through the relevant diplomatic channels or through the Embassy concerned, of any action or consideration undertaken by the Government in relation to the issues raised.

The undersigned humbly hopes that the Government of Your Excellency will kindly give thoughtful consideration to the proposals contained in the earlier representation and in this reminder memorandum.

Introduction

This policy note accompanies the detailed representation submitted by the Mission for Global Change (MGC) to the Governments of 194 Member States of the United Nations on 10 April, 2024. The purpose of the present note is to provide a concise explanation of the conceptual foundations and policy significance of the proposals contained in that representation.

The proposals arise from the independent research and political thinking of Shri Vishwatma, Chairman of the Mission for Global Change, who has been engaged for several years in developing a systematic framework for the evolution of global political institutions suited to the realities of the twenty-first and upcoming centuries.

The intention of this initiative is not merely to call for peace or general reforms but to invite the governments of the world to evaluate a **comprehensive conceptual outline proposed for upgrading the architecture of global governance**.

The Emerging Governance Gap

The contemporary world is characterized by unprecedented levels of economic interdependence, technological integration, and transnational flows of capital, information, and resources. At the same time, humanity continues to face recurring armed conflicts, economic inequalities, environmental degradation, and large-scale humanitarian crises.

While national governments remain the primary political authorities, many of the challenges confronting societies today extend far beyond national jurisdictions. In practice, no single government possesses the institutional capacity to regulate global markets, prevent terrorism and international conflicts promptly, or guarantee economic justice and environmental stability on a worldwide scale.

These developments have created what may be described as a **structural governance gap** between the globalized nature of contemporary problems and the institutional capacities available within the present international political system.

Although the creation of the United Nations represented a historic step toward international cooperation, the existing structure of the organization was designed in a geopolitical context that differs significantly from the realities of the present era.

Need for Conceptual Innovation

Policy frameworks within foreign ministries and international organizations often operate within established academic paradigms and inherited political thoughts and institutional structures. Such frameworks provide continuity and predictability; however, they may also limit the ability of policymakers to explore transformative institutional ideas when confronted with structural global challenges.

The Mission for Global Change respectfully submits that the present moment requires **conceptual innovation in the field of political thought and global organization**, similar to the intellectual and institutional transformations that historically led to the emergence of constitutional democracies and modern international institutions.

The proposals contained in the accompanying representation therefore aim to stimulate **serious policy evaluation rather than immediate acceptance**, recognizing that institutional innovation must ultimately emerge through collective deliberation among sovereign states.

Core Conceptual Contributions

The conceptual framework developed by Shri Vishwatma and his team members introduces several innovative ideas intended to stimulate policy discussion among governments and scholars. These include:

1. Vertical Structuring of Governance

Historically, democratic political development involved the **horizontal separation of powers** within nation states. The present stage of global interdependence may require an additional dimension—**vertical structuring of governance**—linking governments of member states with regional and global institutions capable of addressing transnational challenges.

2. Evolution of Citizenship and Sovereignty

The proposals introduce the idea that citizenship and sovereignty may gradually evolve to include **national, international, and global dimensions of rights and responsibilities**, reflecting the interconnected nature of modern societies.

3. Multi-Layered Institutional Architecture

The framework envisages a gradual institutional evolution consisting of:

- **regional unions of neighbouring countries**, broadly inspired by the cooperative experience of the European Union;
- **hemispheric coordination mechanisms** among such regional unions;
- and ultimately a **reformed and strengthened global institutional structure** emerging through the structural evolution of the United Nations.

4. Protection of International and Global Rights

The proposals also explore the possibility of recognizing certain categories of **international and global rights of domestic citizens of member states**, which could be protected through cooperative supranational institutions while fully respecting the sovereignty of nation states.

Availability of Conceptual Frameworks

It may be respectfully clarified that the Mission for Global Change does not seek merely to raise abstract ideas. The initiative is supported by **conceptual papers, institutional outlines, and preliminary frameworks** that attempt to describe the possible structure and functioning of the institutions proposed as above.

These materials are intended as **working concepts** for policy evaluation and intellectual debate rather than as rigid blueprints.

Invitation to Governments

The Mission for Global Change respectfully invites foreign ministries and policy institutions of Member States to:

- examine the representation and its accompanying conceptual materials;
- evaluate the proposed institutional ideas from the perspective of domestic and global interests;
- provide constructive suggestions, critiques, or alternative approaches through the Government of India; and
- consider initiating academic or policy discussions on the evolution of global governance.

Concluding Observation
